Supported by members

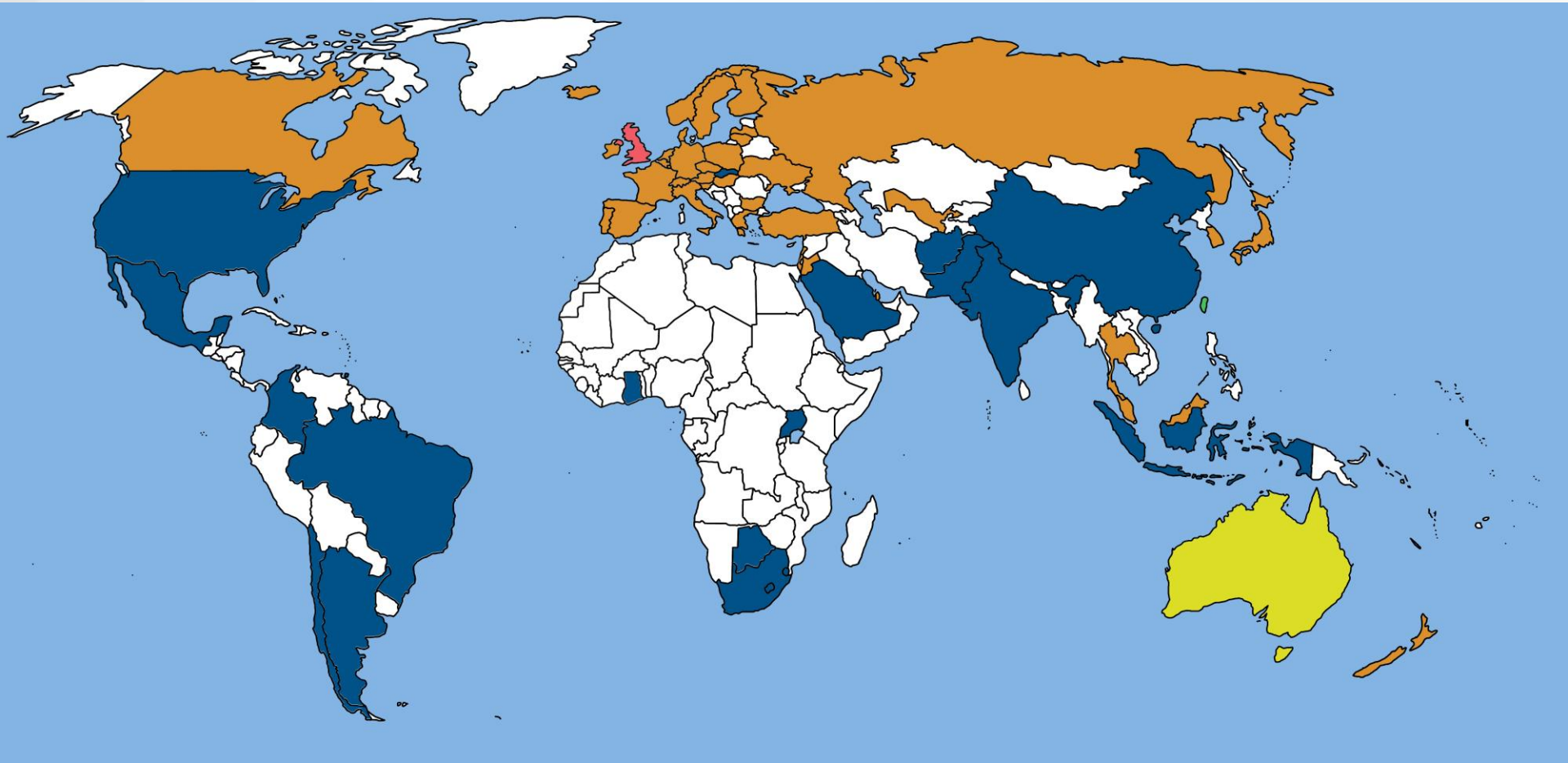
summer 2008: PraxisUnico, AUTM and ASTP carried out research amongst our members

people being approved ('RTTP')

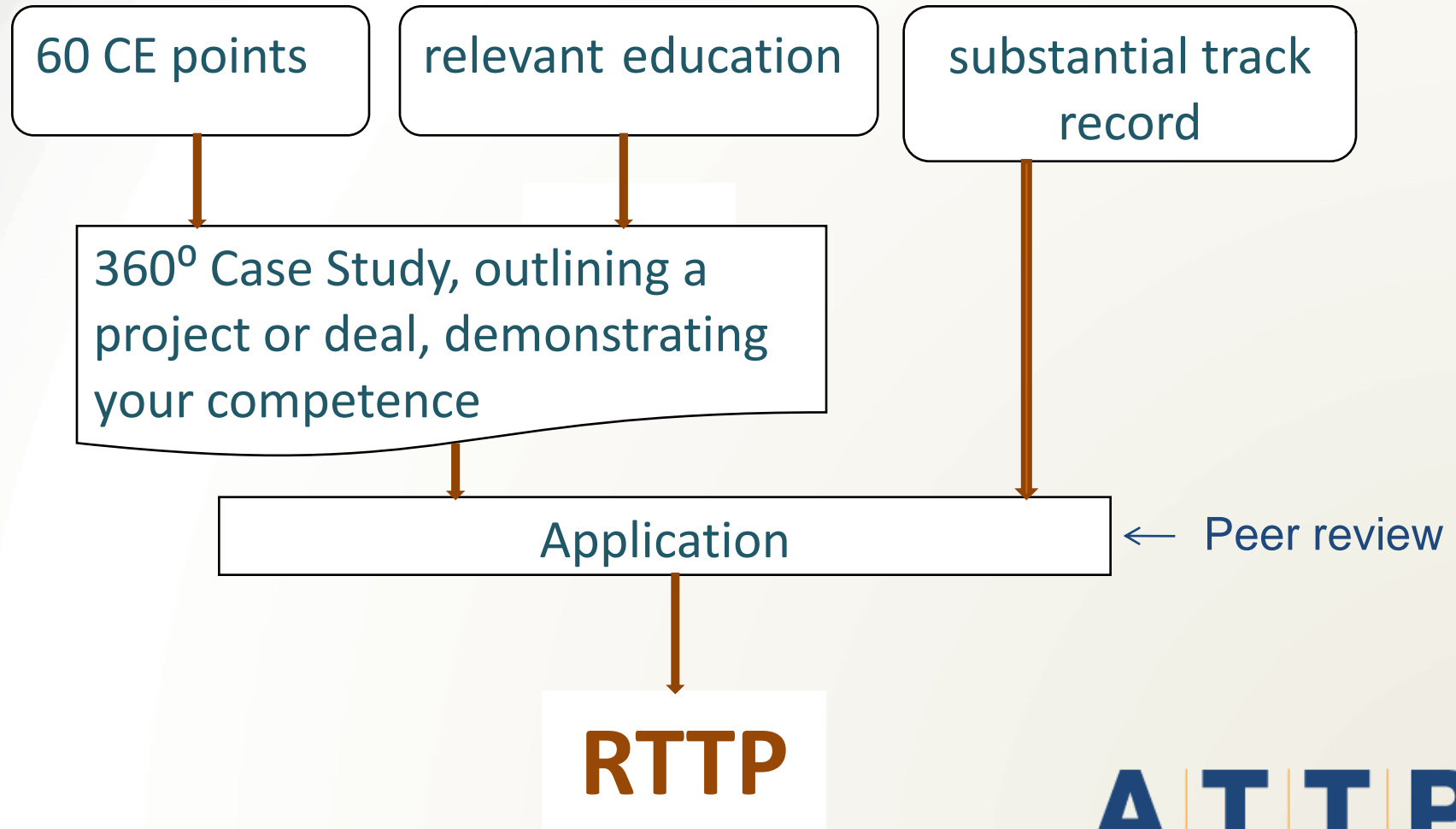

Application process

- Online
- Available to all members of the founding associations
- Applications considered by an international panel of practitioners.
- \$250 administration charge
- No annual fees, but there will be an administration charge associated with confirmation of registration every 3 to 5 years

Latest developments, March 2011

- * CLP will consider ATTP approved CE-points for their CLP recertification, on topics of
 - licensing,
 - technology transfer and
 - technology commercialization
- * new TT associations will be invited to become a member of ATTP, incl a recognition scheme to approve their training
